Item 3.1**Vale Pat Waterman****File No: S051491****Minute by the Lord Mayor**

To Council:

I wish to inform Council of the passing of Patricia (Pat) Waterman on 14 February 2025, aged 74.

Known as Trish to her family and Pat to her friends and the Woolloomooloo community, she was born at Crown Street Women's Hospital in 1950, the fourth of 7 children.

Growing up in Chippendale, she was raised by her father Patrick Murphy after her mother passed away when she was 9 years old.

It was while living in Chippendale that Pat met John Waterman. They were married for 57 years, and had 5 children, Brad, Dean, Wesley, Simon and Julie, 7 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

After living in Newtown, they moved to Woolloomooloo in 1984, where Pat became an outspoken advocate for the Woolloomooloo community, continually campaigning for better public housing conditions.

As a long-standing resident representative on the Woolloomooloo Neighbourhood Advisory Board, she met regularly with NSW Police, Council and Department of Housing officers to identify and solve local problems. She diligently attended meetings, and advocated for people who were intimidated by the system and did not feel they could speak for themselves.

As Woolloomooloo neighbour and friend Patricia "Little Patti" Mellote said, Pat was known as someone who held no punches and someone the community could rely and depend upon. The Woolloomooloo community knew she would stand up for them on housing issues. She was a fighter and got results.

I first met Pat when I was elected as Member for Bligh in 1988. Pat introduced me to the Woolloomooloo community and fast became someone I could rely on for frank advice about what was happening in the community and whether the State Government were following through on their commitments to public housing tenants in the area.

Pat cared about Woolloomooloo and wanted it to be clean and safe, and for public housing tenants' homes to be properly looked after by the State Government. She regularly reported issues to me as her Local Member, and later to Member for Sydney, Alex Greenwich, and we worked together to get good outcomes.

In 2013, Pat was awarded Sydney Electorate Woman of the Year Award by the Member for Sydney, Alex Greenwich, for her dedication and hard work to make Woolloomooloo a strong and safe neighbourhood.

Pat letterboxed for the City of Sydney for more than a decade, but she did more than just deliver notices. I am grateful that Pat actively encouraged people to attend our Woolloomooloo social housing meetings. Her support made a significant difference because she was a trusted member of the community, known for her reliability and passion.

Pat helped many people, and she will be remembered for her advocacy and service. She will be greatly missed.

Vale Vittorio Bianchi

Minute by the Lord Mayor

To Council:

On Tuesday 18 March 2025, Kings Cross lost a strong link to its colourful past with the passing of one its most flamboyant identities, Vittorio Bianchi.

Born in Seiano, a village 37km from Naples in 1934, Vittorio migrated to Australia when he was 14. Arriving in Sydney, he initially lived in Belfield with his uncle, aunt and 2 sisters, Maria and Rosa. His first jobs were in a box factory, working for his uncle at Paddy's Markets, and then as a shoe salesman.

In 1964, the then-owner of the Piccolo, a tiny coffee shop in Roslyn Street, offered him a job. From that moment, Vittorio and the Piccolo would be synonymous. He later became a partner in the business and in 1994 he bought it.

From the 1960s to the early 1990s, Kings Cross was the centre of a colourful nightlife, which spilled into the early hours of the following day. Catering to people of all ages and interests, it was supported by a dense and diverse residential population and the guests of the many tower hotels, including the Sebel Town House, which opened in 1963. Les Girls, just up the road on the corner of Darlinghurst Road and Roslyn Street, opened in the same year.

Open 24 hours a day in those years, the Piccolo not surprisingly attracted an eclectic clientele: locals, visitors from the suburbs, celebrities staying at the Sebel, performers of all types looking for somewhere to go after their shows came down.

Among those who drank Vittorio's coffee were Marianne Faithfull, the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Gough Whitlam, Reg Livermore, Brett Whiteley, Jeannie Lewis, Noah Taylor, Ben Mendelsohn, Graeme Murphy and me when I was Member for Bligh.

Vittorio was an ebullient if sometimes acerbic host. If you had recently attracted public attention or a small dose of fame, he would make space for you, even if it was already full. If you hadn't been there for a few months, he would likely greet you with: "Where have you been? I thought you were dead!"

He was a natural performer, and spent 5 years training as an actor with Hayes Gordon's Ensemble Studios. Getting work as an actor was however difficult in those days, given his thick Italian accent. He did however perform regularly with Cabaret Conspiracy, a weekly Sunday night event at Garibaldi's in East Sydney in the late 1970s.

The Piccolo was his principal stage. It was here he could perform as himself and enjoy the friendship of many of Sydney's actors and performers.

In 2015 and again in 2016, the Piccolo briefly became a theatre, when it presented Piccolo Tales supported by a City of Sydney grant. Devised by Vashti Hughes, a cabaret performer and a close friend of Vittorio's, it told the story of Kings Cross from the 1950s. Vashti alternated between playing Vittorio and iconic figures from each decade, among them a notorious nightclub boss, a 19-year-old American soldier on R&R during the Vietnam War, a Les Girls star, a nightclub DJ and a young mother.

Vittorio was the other cast member. The Sydney Morning Herald reviewer wrote of his performance "... while the man himself, sitting in his customary window seat, chips in insults, grumbles about the service, and lends his voice to musical numbers which include a hilarious rapped-out list of fashion and social crimes."

The audience was limited to just 20 people for each show – 10 seated inside and 10 sitting outside on the pavement. At its return season in 2016, the audience increased a little, with people sitting on the ledge of the park opposite wearing wi-fi headsets.

In June the following year, the Piccolo closed, brought about by the lockout laws, rising costs and Vittorio's deteriorating health. Its closure was reported by several media outlets, with most recalling its significant past, its clientele and its recent national prominence gained through the TV series, Rake. As one writer noted, "Cleaver Greene, played by Richard Roxburgh, was forever falling out of bed in his tiny flat upstairs and heading downstairs to the Piccolo Bar for something to revive him before a court appearance."

At the time of its closure, Vittorio told the Sydney Morning Herald: "I will miss all the crazy people, all the artists, musicians, writers and politicians that used to come. That was the only coffee shop open at night, all night," he says. "People never wanted to go home."

All the crazy people, the artists, musicians, writers and politicians that once frequented the Piccolo, now are mourning Vittorio's passing. Mingled with this are memories of the Piccolo, its walls covered with photographs, the aromas of minestrone soup and coffee and Vittorio's engaging presence.

With Vittorio's passing, King's Cross has lost a little of its soul.

Recommendation

Councillor Arkins considers that this non-pecuniary conflict of interest is not significant and does not require further action in the circumstances as they are former colleagues and it has no bearing on the item before Committees.

Councillor Adam Worling disclosed a less than significant, non-pecuniary interest in Item 8.3 on the agenda, in that he represented the Lord Mayor by speaking at the City Recital Hall Amplification Renewal Project in July 2023. Since then, he has attended the venue to meet with former Chief Executive Officer, Justin Boschetti, current Chief Executive Officer, Kate Wickett, and has accepted the City's Protocol tickets to attend performances at the venue. Councillor Worling considers that this non-pecuniary conflict of interest is not significant and does not require further action in the circumstances as he did not discuss the ongoing operational funding with anyone from City Recital Hall and it has not influenced his consideration of the matter.

Item 8.3**Grants and Sponsorship - City Recital Hall Ongoing Operational Funding and Sublease**

Staff Recommendation

The staff recommendation to the Cultural, Creative and Nightlife Committee was as follows -

It is resolved that:

- (A) Council approve a cash grant of \$1,000,000 per year for 5 years from 2025/26 to 2029/30 to City Recital Hall Limited for ongoing operational funding;
- (B) Council note that the grant amount is exclusive of GST;
- (C) Council approve the grant of a new sublease to City Recital Hall Limited for City Recital Hall, 1 Angel Place, Sydney with no annual rent payments for a term of 5 years with a commencement date of 1 July 2025;
- (D) Council approve changing the name of the City Recital Hall and City Recital Hall Limited seeking broader sponsorship and philanthropy to support its ongoing feasibility, which may incorporate sponsored naming rights in consultation with Council, and which will be included in the terms of the sublease;

Major Capital Works Projects

Since 2018, there has been \$7.5M capital works expenditure on aquatic and recreation facilities and there is \$10.1M capital works expenditure currently in progress. There is currently \$9.6M capital works expenditure allocated to future renewal and upgrades to aquatic and leisure facilities in the FY25 Long Term Financial Plan. The future year renewal and upgrade budgets have been reviewed, and adjustments are proposed in the FY26 Long Term Financial Plan.

Minor Works Delivered Through Asset Renewal Programs

Since 2018 there has been \$14.5M capital expenditure on aquatic and leisure facilities delivered through the City's asset renewal programs. There is currently \$23.4M capital expenditure allocated to future renewal and upgrades of aquatic and recreation facilities in the 10 year asset renewal programs included in the FY25 Long Term Financial Plan.

The City's asset renewal programs are 10 year funding programs that deliver renewal and minor upgrade works to existing assets. Works delivered under these programs include renewal of building structures, interiors, services (mechanical, electrical, hydraulic, lift etc), and plant and assets.

Examples of works delivered under these programs include items such as replacement of outdoor shade umbrellas (Prince Alfred Park), change-over to LED light fittings (all facilities), and lift renewal (in progress at Andrew Boy Charlton Pool).

Managing Disruptions to Services

The City makes all endeavours to minimise disruption to services for any works required to be undertaken. Where possible we make temporary adjustments to services rather than closing facilities.

From 2018 onwards there has only been one full closure of a facility. This is the current closure of the Andrew (Boy) Charlton Pool which is required to undertake structural remediation and pool re-tiling works. While this shutdown is taking place the City is also completing an upgrade of the lift and converting from gas to 100% renewable electricity to reach our Net Zero emissions by 2035. From 2018 there have been 10 partial closures required temporary adjustment to services.

Closures and temporary service adjustments are notified to Council by way of a CEO Update and the community and affected stakeholders are notified in advance of works commencing on site. City of Sydney 360 members are provided with access to any other City of Sydney aquatic and fitness centre while the works are underway. Members who prefer to pause their memberships may do so without affecting their usual suspension allowance.

Improved Transport Outcomes for Millers Point

By Councillor Worling

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) Millers Point is an historic harbourside suburb on the north-western edge of central Sydney home to a close-knit community and some of Sydney's most significant sites such as Observatory Hill, Barangaroo Reserve, Walsh Bay Arts Precinct and The Rocks, which attract millions of tourists every year;
- (ii) making Sydney a city for walking, cycling and public transport is one of the ten strategic directions in Sustainable Sydney 2030-2050 Continuing the Vision and the soon-to-be refreshed Community Strategic Plan Delivering Sustainable Sydney 2030-2050;
- (iii) our communities told us they want to live close to a quality public transport network that is accessible, reliable, integrated, safe, affordable, environmentally friendly and prioritises space for people over cars and parking while maintaining access for business;
- (iv) Millers Point Community Resident Action Group (MPCRAG) has advocated for many years for public transport improvements that reduce traffic and parking congestion in their area and the opening of the new Metro station at Barangaroo has been a very welcome addition to help relieve that;
- (v) however, large events such as VIVID and New Years' Eve are attracting more and more people to the peninsula meaning people need more public transport options including at night to get in and out of the area as quickly as possible;
- (vi) the ferry wharves at Barangaroo and Circular Quay are over a kilometre away, and the area is often prone to traffic congestion along Hickson Road, particularly before and after theatre events when many people use private vehicles, car share and taxis to attend because of the lack of public transport;
- (vii) a ferry service linking Walsh Bay with Circular Quay, Barangaroo and the new Sydney Fish Market, would boost tourism and economic activity along the western harbour; and
- (viii) the community is also calling for integrated public transport ticketing as a way to alleviate traffic congestion in The Rocks and Millers Point. This would reduce the need for taxis and car share to transport cruise ship passengers to and from the Overseas Passenger Terminal;

(B) Council further note that:

- (i) last year, the NSW Government announced a Shore Power project at White Bay Cruise Terminal to be operational by late 2026 that provides wharf-side infrastructure that provides cruise ships with electricity by connecting to a landside charger, which results in less noise, air and water pollution and fewer emissions as the engine does not have to stay running while docked;
- (ii) the NSW Port Authority is investigating the feasibility of installing shore power at the Overseas Passenger Terminal but there are no firm plans in place;
- (iii) there is growing pressure to expand Sydney's cruise ship capacity, and the NSW Government has established the Cruising Industry Advisory Panel to provide advice on strategies. This could see more ships using the Overseas Passenger Terminal increasing their emissions even more; and
- (iv) last year, the Member for Sydney wrote to the NSW Minister for the Environment requesting an air quality monitoring station at Circular Quay to collect data associated with cruise ship emissions. The Minister's reply said they are reviewing the Air Quality Monitoring Plan at the end of this year and will assess the needs for monitoring across NSW; and

(C) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to:

- (i) the NSW Minister for Transport urging him to improve public transport options in the Millers Point area by investigating providing a Sydney Ferries stop at Walsh Bay as well as integrated ticketing for cruise ship passengers arriving from the Overseas Passenger Terminal to encourage them to use public transport; and
- (ii) the NSW Minister for the Environment calling on her to accelerate feasibility studies for installing shore power at the Overseas Passenger Terminal and in the meantime, prioritise installation of an air quality monitor at Circular Quay to collect data associated with cruise ship emissions as part of the Air Quality Monitoring Plan currently under review.

Action on Gaming Machines

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) as at 31 December 2024, there were 3,671 gaming machines in the City of Sydney;
- (ii) people who gamble in the City of Sydney lost over \$110 million in just 3 months between September and December 2024, yet the highest losses are in Fairfield, Canterbury-Bankstown and Cumberland areas;
- (iii) unlike many countries, Australia does not limit gaming machines to casinos and betting shops, but instead permits them in hotels, clubs and pubs. Gaming machines are everywhere;
- (iv) in 2022, Council supported a Lord Mayoral Minute about the proliferation of gambling in NSW. In response, Council resolved to support a mandatory cashless gaming card and other harm minimisation initiatives;
- (v) the NSW Government has attempted to reform the gambling industry and reduce its harmful impacts by:
 - (a) banning political donations from clubs involved in gaming;
 - (b) reducing the cash input limit from \$5,000 to \$500 for all new poker machines;
 - (c) banning all external gambling-related signage, however, some signage has simply been converted or tweaked to bypass legislation;
 - (d) introducing a cashless gaming trial, however, with limited participants, it was ineffective and found that voluntary systems do not work;
 - (e) requiring Responsible Gaming Officers; and
 - (f) working on tackling money laundering in casinos;
- (vi) while action is being taken to regulate illegal activities in casinos, there is concern that this activity and gambling harm has and will shift to other venues, particularly those with a large number of gaming machines;
- (vii) despite NSW Government action, in 2024, gamblers in NSW lost a record \$8.64 billion in gaming machines;

- (viii) the role of successive NSW Governments in enabling this harm is indisputable, and it is incumbent upon the current NSW Government to fix it;
 - (ix) the primary regulatory authority for gaming machines is the NSW Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority (ILGA). It oversees approval and regulation of gaming machines under the Gaming Machines Act 2001 and the Liquor Act 2007;
 - (x) Section 209 of the Gaming Machines Act 2001 prevents planning instruments and conditions of development consent from prohibiting or otherwise restricting the installation, keeping or operation of gaming machines. The repeal of this section would enable councils to establish their own provisions regarding gaming machines in local environmental plans;
 - (xi) councils can request design amendments to ensure compliance with the [Location of Gaming Machines requirements](#) set out by ILGA under the Gaming Machines Act 2001, or object to a venue's proposal to include a significant number of gaming machines, particularly if there are concerns about the social and community impacts. However, the final decision rests with ILGA, which has the ultimate authority to approve or reject such applications;
 - (xii) the Smoke Free Environment Act 2000 enables smoking in "outdoor areas" of hotels. In practice, areas can be considered outdoor if they are 75% enclosed and this enables venues to create "outdoor" gaming areas by simply providing openings in rooms. This means patrons can comfortably play at a machine for extended periods while smoking and even being served drinks and food;
 - (xiii) smoking in such enclosed spaces worsens impacts from gambling by affecting people's health and encouraging longer periods of gambling. Smoking should be prohibited in gaming areas in the same way it is prohibited in dining areas;
 - (xiv) community members have raised concerns about:
 - (a) venues trading late to operate their gaming rooms and these hours should be restricted; and
 - (b) that lights and noise from gaming machines in "outdoor" gaming areas can be seen and heard from public places and peoples' homes, in contravention to ILGA's Location of Gaming Machines requirements;
 - (xv) studies repeatedly highlight the link between gambling and suicide, bankruptcy and criminal behaviour, including family violence; and
 - (xvi) it is clear councils should have greater authority over gaming machines which harm local communities, individuals, families and workplaces;
- (B) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to the NSW Minister for Health asking him to:
- (i) review and update the current definition of an "outdoor" area; and
 - (ii) amend Section 6A of the Smoke Free Environment Act 2000 by including gaming machine areas as areas where smoking is prohibited, in the same way that commercial dining areas are listed; and

- (C) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to the NSW Minister for Gaming and Racing and the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces asking them to work together and:
- (i) repeal Section 209 of the Gaming Machines Act 2001 to enable councils to establish their own provisions regarding gaming machines in local environmental plans giving them greater planning authority to assess the number, location, operating hours, lights and noise of gaming machines; and
 - (ii) take further action to reduce gambling harm including investigating the introduction of gaming room hours, similar to license hours, to restrict the hours gaming machines can operate.

A Safer Swanson Street for Erskineville

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) last month, a woman and her son were hit by a car at the pedestrian crossing on Swanson Street between Harry Noble Reserve and the Kurrajong Hotel in Erskineville;
- (ii) Swanson Street is a State-controlled road and therefore, Transport for NSW is responsible for implementing road safety measures there;
- (iii) Swanson Street has a speed limit of 40km/h as it's part of a designated "High Pedestrian Activity Area";
- (iv) for over a year, residents including Friends of Erskineville have been raising concerns about the need for the existing pedestrian crossing on Swanson Street between Harry Noble Reserve and the Kurrajong Hotel to be upgraded to a raised crossing to improve visibility, slow traffic, and improve safety for people walking;
- (v) in February 2024, the Lord Mayor wrote to the then NSW Minister for Roads supporting the community's request and calling on the Minister to ensure Transport for NSW delivers a raised pedestrian crossing on Swanson Street following community consultation;
- (vi) the Minister for Roads responded to the Lord Mayor stating that Transport for NSW would investigate the feasibility of installing a raised crossing on the existing crossing and if appropriate, seek funding for it. The Minister noted that projects are prioritised based on strict criteria which includes reported crashes, road geometry, and the safety benefits returned to the community;
- (vii) City of Sydney staff followed up with Transport for NSW who recently confirmed that they have nominated the raised pedestrian crossing on Swanson Street for funding – it is currently at Project Nomination Stage;
- (viii) this crossing would complement the City of Sydney's improvements and traffic calming measures in the area, including a raised pedestrian crossing on Park Street at Swanson Street, and other treatments endorsed by Council in October 2023 guided by the Alexandria and Erskineville Traffic and Transport Study; and
- (ix) City of Sydney staff recently pruned the garden beds on both sides of the existing pedestrian crossing on Swanson Street at Harry Noble Reserve and in front of the Kurrajong Hotel to improve sightlines for road users; and

- (B) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to the NSW Minister for Roads calling on the NSW Government to:
- (i) allocate funding to and deliver a raised pedestrian crossing on Swanson Street between Harry Noble Reserve and The Kurrajong Hotel in Erskineville to improve safety for all road users as soon as possible;
 - (ii) in the meantime, refresh the road markings on the existing pedestrian crossing to improve safety until the new raised pedestrian crossing is installed; and
 - (iii) reduce the road speed on Swanson Street in Erskineville to 30km/h as it is a high activity area close to the local village centre.

Coordinating Utilities for Better Street and Community Outcomes

- (i) the City of Sydney's Community Strategic Plan (Sustainable Sydney 2030-2050 Continuing the Vision) clearly outlines the importance of public street and footpath spaces to accommodate safe pedestrian and vehicle access, outdoor dining, landscaping and urban greening;
- (ii) each year the City invests millions of dollars into public domain, road, footpath and cycleway renewals and upgrades in line with the Sydney Streets Design Code and Technical Specifications;
- (iii) the NSW Streets Opening Coordination Council (SOCC) is a voluntary association of member organisations that seeks to improve the coordination of works in the public domain to minimise disruption arising from the installation, operation and maintenance of utility services; currently it provides 2 guides designed to coordinate public works, however these are non-statutory;
- (iv) for renewal and upgrade projects, City staff consult with authorities such as Ausgrid, Sydney Water, Telstra and gas utilities to notify them of upcoming works, however utilities do not require council approval for their work which can involve tree removal, temporary asphaltting of the street and prolonged street closures;
- (v) community concerns have been raised about the lack of notification, significant delays, removal of trees, waste and poor management of projects specifically in Wilson Street, Newtown; and
- (vi) a lack of effective policy settings that compels utilities to coordinate and communicate street and public domain works has resulted in loss of amenity, prolonged delays and expensive restoration processes, where the City is forced to 'fix' streets where utility work has been undertaken;

- (B) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to report back via a CEO Update advising what measures are in place to coordinate with utility providers for undertaking works and other initiatives that may be underway to improve outcomes for the community; and
- (C) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to NSW Minister for Water, Rose Jackson, NSW Minister for Energy, Penny Sharpe, and the Federal Minister for Telecommunications, Michelle Rowland calling for:
 - (i) a review of existing policy that results in greater accountability, integration and communication between utility companies and councils;
 - (ii) greater oversight and accountability of contractors undertaking work on behalf of companies; and
 - (iii) a centralised mechanism to coordinate works and for the community to request information and report issues.

Item 12.5**Notices of Motion****Addressing Poverty and Inequality in the City of Sydney**

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) more than 5 million Australians are barely scraping by on Centrelink payment rates below the poverty line, and millions more are struggling with the cost of living;
- (ii) members of our community receiving this support are forced to make impossible choices between paying rent, purchasing food, or buying essential medicine, while low-income earners are 10 times more likely to have no internet connection at home;
- (iii) income support should provide people with enough to cover basic necessities to live a healthy and dignified life, rather than keeping them in a cycle of financial struggle and survival;
- (iv) economic inequality is a major problem in the City of Sydney, there are persistent gaps between groups in Sydney that enjoy the majority of benefits of the city's growth compared with the groups that do not; and
- (v) Australia's mutual obligations framework forces jobseekers to complete tasks such as applying for jobs or attending training, or have their payments stopped. The scheme is highly controversial and potentially unlawful, with numerous leading advocates and organisations critiquing the system as unfair, ineffective and enormously harmful to people in poverty due to abusive providers;

(B) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to the Prime Minister, the Treasurer, and the Minister for Social Services, asking them to commit to raising JobSeeker, Youth Allowance, and related payments to at least \$82 per day, equivalent to the pension rate, to ensure all members of our community experiencing hardship can live with dignity, and urging immediate action to address this critical issue of inequality;

(C) Council adopt the position that Centrelink payment rates must be urgently raised above the poverty line, and advocates for this important reform; and

(D) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to write to the Anti-Poverty Centre, Economic Justice Australia, Yfoundations, Deadly Connections, Unemployed Workers Union and any other relevant organisations in the Local Government Area to ask what the City can do to address widening inequality, and any additional practical support the City can provide to those experiencing and at risk of poverty in our communities.

Protecting and Expanding Native Bat Habitat

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) Bat Appreciation Day will be observed on 17 April;
- (ii) the City of Sydney is home to a variety of threatened bat species, including the Grey-Headed Flying Fox (GHFF) and Microbat species such as the Gould's Wattled Bat, Eastern Freetail Bat and Little Forest Bat;
- (iii) the Grey-Headed Flying Fox is vital to the health and regeneration of native flora species across Australia, as the migration patterns and dietary requirements of this species provides a consistent and effective means of transportation for pollen and larger seeds across vast distances;
- (iv) in Sydney, the Grey-Headed Flying Fox is known to periodically inhabit bushland close by the city, with large camps being observed in mass at the Centennial Park and formerly at the Royal Botanical Garden prior to the State- and Federal- authorised initiative to relocate this species;
- (v) current estimates suggest that up to 45,000 Grey-Headed Flying Fox roost at Centennial Park's Lachlan Swamp;
- (vi) Grey-Headed Flying Fox are increasingly moving into urban areas in response to changing environmental conditions such as food scarcity and habitat loss;
- (vii) Microbats consume 50% of their body weight in insects each night, serving as effective and natural control for insect populations; and
- (viii) Microbat population and habitat is threatened by deforestation and urbanisation, as well as the misuse of insecticides that diminish the bats' insect prey;

(B) Council recognise:

- (i) Mosman Council supports native species, including Microbats, by transforming dead trees into 'Habitat Stag Trees' to serve as nesting and foraging sites as well as shelter for a variety of wildlife;
- (ii) Lake Macquarie City Council have committed to the restoration and enhancement of flying fox habitat to encourage camps to move further away from residential areas; and
- (iii) Brisbane City Council regularly inspects the condition of Grey-Headed Flying Fox food availability to ensure that this species is sufficiently supported;

- (C) Council further note the findings and targets included in the 2014 Urban Ecology Strategic Action Plan:
- (i) the Grey-Headed Flying Fox and Microbats are among eight species classified as 'priority fauna' species, as they are threatened species generally uncommon in urban areas; and
 - (ii) limited habitat availability, destruction and fragmentation of habitat, and seasonal food scarcity were identified as key threats to Grey-Headed Flying Fox and Microbat species within the Local Government Area;
- (D) Council reaffirm its commitment to protecting and supporting all native species, including the Grey-Headed Flying Fox and Microbats;
- (E) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to the Minister for Planning and Public Spaces, Paul Scully and the Chief Executive of Greater Sydney Parklands, Joshua French to:
- (i) reiterate support on behalf of the City for the partial conversion of Moore Park, particularly to further enhance biodiversity, protect native species, and progress the development of habitat linkages; and
 - (ii) communicate the urgency of protecting and supporting all native species, including but not limited to the Grey-Headed Flying Fox and Microbats, given the current climate emergency; and
- (F) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to investigate and report back to Council on the following as soon as practical:
- (i) advice from the Council's Urban Ecology Team as to how the City can support local and transient bat species, including but not limited to:
 - (a) expanding support for 'Habitat Stag Trees' and hollow trees;
 - (b) expanding biodiversity corridors;
 - (c) identifying and protecting existing bat camps and roosting areas;
 - (d) investigating potential sites such as Jubilee Park, Sydney Park, Moore Park, Hyde Park and Victoria Park which could support native bat species with remediation or planting work by the City;
 - (e) planting more bat-friendly vegetation including fruiting trees;
 - (f) eliminating pesticide use in bat habitat, particularly through encouraging direct and indirect species interactions to manage pests; and
 - (g) implementing a system for recording threatened species activity within the City's parks and urban areas, including visual, acoustic and aerial monitoring, surveying and any other relevant data collections; and
 - (ii) incorporate advice and findings from the Urban Ecology Coordinator into the new Urban Ecology Strategic Action Plan.

Item 12.7**Notices of Motion****Taxing SUVs in the City of Sydney - Tripling Parking Rates for Polluting Killer Cars**

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) the average size and weight of private vehicles continues to grow, with most new vehicles sold in 2024 being Sport Utility Vehicles (SUVs) - about 57% of all purchases, an increase of 2.4% on the previous year;
- (ii) SUVs, including luxury SUVs, are vehicles that combine the features of a passenger car with those of an off-road vehicle. They are typically larger and heavier than standard passenger cars, with higher ground clearance;
- (iii) SUVs are killers – they are far more dangerous than normal passenger cars and pose increased risks to pedestrians, cyclists and other road-users, with children eight times more likely to die when hit by a SUV. Their higher ground clearance makes them more likely to collide with a pedestrian's head or chest, making them more deadly; their height also increases the risk of backing over pedestrians;
- (iv) if SUVs were a country, they would be the world's fifth largest emitter of CO₂. Large and heavy vehicles like SUVs consume up to 25% more fuel per kilometre and emit 20% more carbon emissions than other cars as well as pollutants with direct public health effects, such as nitrous oxides;
- (v) the rise of bigger, heavier, dirtier SUVs is wiping out the climate gains from the switch to electric vehicles, and the transport sector is projected to become the biggest source of emissions by 2030; and
- (vi) heavier vehicles increase damage on inner-city roads, thereby increasing maintenance costs on roads, with the largest SUVs doing 16 times more damage than small cars on Australian roads;

(B) Council further note:

- (i) in 2008 the City of Sydney introduced a resident vehicle parking fee schedule which offers 'green concessions' in order to encourage vehicles that with comparatively fewer tailpipe CO₂ emissions pay lower fees;
- (ii) Parisians voted on 4 February 2024 to triple the parking rates for the heaviest, bulkiest, most polluting SUVs, compared to other vehicles. Other French cities including Lyon are now taking similar action; and

- (iii) the Mayor of London has commented in support of higher parking rates for SUVs, as implemented in Paris; and
- (C) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to:
 - (i) investigate and report back on the possibility of instituting a Paris-style system imposing higher rates for parking larger and heavier vehicles such as SUVs, including the potential to triple the cost of parking for the heaviest, most polluting, dangerous and bulky vehicles;
 - (ii) in preparing the review, ensure that any potential changes consider appropriate equity caveats (for example, considering the needs of people with disabilities, tradespeople, including those who are eligible for Council's tradesperson permit for parking, and other people with specific mobility or business requirements);
 - (iii) ensure appropriate consultation with people who may be impacted, including with groups such as disability advocacy bodies, road safety groups, existing users of Council's tradesperson's permit, and local schools; and
 - (iv) ensure that any proposed changes do not perversely discourage the switch to cleaner vehicles which are heavier due to their batteries.

Extending the Fee Waiver for Community Spaces in the City of Sydney

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) Council has a wide range of community venues for hire including town halls, community centres, library meeting rooms and other spaces;
- (ii) Council provides free and discounted hire of its community spaces to not-for-profits, and a range of other groups;
- (iii) introduced at the request of resident groups, since 2022 Council has waived the hire fee, and also offered free coverage by Council's public liability insurance, for eligible 'local community groups' hiring community venues;
- (iv) the fee waiver has supported the community to reconnect post-Covid, helped re-activate community spaces, and supported the formation of new local community groups. In addition to resident groups, examples of groups who have accessed the free hire include anti-poverty groups, anti-racism groups, meditation groups, social clubs, sustainable crafts groups, and more;
- (v) this small but important measure helps the City deliver on its social sustainability policy and goals. The percentage of City Spaces facilities and venues at community or reduced rates or through a fee waiver is one of the measures that Council uses to track progress towards Council's goal that "Everyone has equitable and affordable access to community and cultural facilities and programs, supporting social connection and wellbeing";
- (vi) in the most recent budget, Council committed to maintain the fee waiver until 2029;
- (vii) Council's online booking forms have been updated to make it easy to apply for the fee waiver. However, there have been some persistent confusion about which groups meet the definition of a 'local community group' and are eligible for the waiver. Examples of groups where there has been uncertainty include but are not limited to:
 - (a) self-help groups such as mental health support groups;
 - (b) social clubs run by volunteers which charge a small fee to cover costs (for example to pay for equipment like yoga mats), but don't make a profit;

- (c) art groups run by volunteers who charge a small fee to cover the cost of engaging a life model for a class, but otherwise charge no fees;
- (d) union members who work in the city looking for a free space to hold a members' meeting;
- (e) groups who can be defined as a sporting club, for example a group of volunteers which gets together to practice dancing, or a LARPing (live action role play) group;
- (f) parents who live in the city looking to meet with other parents to run activities for their children; and
- (g) groups of artists, performers and musicians who live or frequently perform or exhibit in the City looking to hire free space for rehearsals or galleries;

(B) Council further note:

- (i) loneliness and social isolation has been identified as a growing issue in the Council's draft Community Strategic Plan, shortly to be put on exhibition;
- (ii) the cost to waive fees for those groups which would otherwise have been eligible for a discounted community fee rate is modest;
- (iii) Council's community spaces have capacity to increase bookings; and
- (iv) Council recently agreed to permanently waive footpath dining fees for businesses; and

(C) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to:

- (i) investigate permanently waiving hiring and insurance fees for community spaces for Council's consideration as part of the 2025/26 and forward budgets;
- (ii) undertake a review of the current definition of who has access to the free hire, including groups who have not been considered eligible under the current definition;
- (iii) bring a report to the Council on the findings of this review, so that Council can consider potential variations or expansion to the definition of 'local community groups'; and
- (iv) also update the Council on progress with the online booking system which Council has been developing to make it easier for residents and community organisations to more quickly identify and book spaces.

Affirming the City of Sydney's Support for the Housing Australia Future Fund

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) the Housing Australia Future Fund (HAFF) is a critical national initiative to address Australia's housing affordability crisis and represents the largest investment in social and affordable housing in a generation;
- (ii) the HAFF provides \$10 billion in capital, with a minimum of \$500 million in annual disbursements to support the construction of social and affordable housing across the country;
- (iii) the HAFF aims to deliver 20,000 new social homes and 20,000 new affordable homes over the next five years;
- (iv) as of 17 March 2025, over 183 projects are in the pipeline, expected to deliver more than 18,674 social and affordable homes nationwide, including 442 within the City of Sydney;
- (v) the HAFF is vital to tackling homelessness and housing insecurity, particularly in inner-city areas like ours, where housing demand and cost pressures are especially acute;
- (vi) HAFF-funded construction supports jobs and local businesses, and helps address climate goals through energy-efficient, environmentally sustainable housing;
- (vii) the HAFF is especially important for delivering homes for priority groups such as women, older people, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, groups often locked out of the private housing market;
- (viii) the HAFF was strongly opposed by the Coalition and only passed the Senate in 2023 after months of political obstruction. The Opposition has since signalled that it may repeal or cut the HAFF if elected;
- (ix) this threat creates serious policy instability. Even the possibility of repeal has a chilling effect on housing investment, slowing delivery and deterring partners;
- (x) policy uncertainty undermines confidence among community housing providers, construction partners, and potential residents; weakening Australia's collective ability to respond to the housing crisis at scale; and

- (xi) if Australia is serious about ending housing insecurity, it must treat housing as essential social infrastructure, and provide long-term, bipartisan certainty in its funding and delivery; and
- (B) the Lord Mayor be requested to write to Prime Minister, the Leader of the Opposition, and the Leader of the Australian Greens, expressing the City of Sydney's strong support for the Housing Australia Future Fund (HAFF);
 - (i) emphasising that the HAFF is essential to the City's ability to meet its affordable housing targets and address cost-of-living pressures;
 - (ii) calling on all federal parties to commit to the long-term future of the HAFF and reject any proposals to repeal, cut, or destabilise the HAFF; and
 - (iii) noting that continued political threats to the HAFF, even if not enacted, already risk delaying projects, reducing investor confidence, and making the housing crisis worse.

Better Coverage at Our Public BBQs

It is resolved that:

(A) Council note:

- (i) the City of Sydney has 76 BBQs in 32 of its parks that are regularly used by residents, community groups, and visitors. Most of the BBQs are either covered, or have nearby tables and seating shaded by fixed structures or tree canopy;
- (ii) the City has playgrounds in 100 of its parks. Most of the play areas have some shading cast by sails, umbrellas, fixed structures or nearby buildings or tree canopy;
- (iii) however, some playground and BBQ areas are not covered or shaded, making them vulnerable to both unforecast rain and extreme heat, particularly during summer;
- (iv) uncovered BBQs and seating areas are more likely to degrade over time due to exposure to sun and rain, and may also contribute to localised heat through surrounding hard concrete surfaces; Community members have raised concerns that some City playgrounds are also in need of sun and weather protection;
- (v) according to recent research by Western Sydney University on mapping the City of Sydney's micro-climates:
 - (a) "air temperatures differ significantly across the city. During hot (35°C+) and extreme heat (40°C+) days, temperature differences from north to south can exceed 10°C"; and
 - (b) recommended actions include: "increase effective cooling measures through direct actions such as more shade," and "reduce surface heat with more shade, reflective materials and by reducing hard surfaces";
- (vi) the City's Adapting for Climate Change strategy projects the number of extreme heat days (over 35°C) to rise from an average of 3.7 days per year currently, to 5.8 by 2030, and 15 by 2070. The strategy notes: "by increasing shade and reducing hard surfaces that absorb the sun's warmth, we actively reduce the heat held in the city, known as the 'urban heat island effect'";
- (vii) the City uses tree canopy and other greening to shade and cool our buildings, streets, footpaths and parks in line with our Greening Sydney Strategy; and

- (viii) the City carries out shade modelling as part of our playground designs and considers installing shade structures as part of playground renewal projects if inadequate natural shade is provided by existing tree canopy or adjacent buildings; and
- (B) the Chief Executive Officer be requested to:
 - (i) explore options to improve shade or rain protection over BBQs with seating areas and playgrounds in our new park designs and renewals;
 - (ii) review and recommend updates to park design processes and policies to ensure that future upgrades and new parks include adequate sun and rain protection, especially at high-use or paved areas such as BBQs with seating and playgrounds; and
 - (iii) report back to Council through the CEO Update on:
 - (a) the number of parks with playgrounds and BBQs with seating areas, and how many currently have fully rain and sun proof coverings; and
 - (b) proposals for potential upgrades to improve coverage and comfort for park users.

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
